
Congregational Meeting

A WORD
FROM THE
PASTOR

Be anxious for nothing, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known to God, and the peace of God, which passes all understanding will keep your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus.

“and deliver us from all needless anxiety...”

Many mental health experts suggest that we are living in an age of high anxiety. Many of us know how anxious we can get when running from one task to the next; schlepping kids from one activity to another, picking up something for dinner, answering overdue emails and phone calls, to say nothing of the terrorist threat.

When Roman Catholics pray the Lord’s Prayer in the Mass, everyone stops at “...and lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil...” Then the priest intones: “deliver us, oh Lord, from evil and from all unnecessary anxiety...” Which, initially, prompts the question: is there such a thing as “necessary anxiety”? I think so. It keeps us moving against deadlines, gets us to work on time, encourages us to pay our bills and helps chronic procrastinators find the proverbial, ‘round to-it’. Being non-anxious comes when we finally drift off into a deep sleep, enjoy a week’s vacation or, for some people, only when medication is prescribed.

Often, anxiety crops up when we anticipate making contact with annoying or unpleasant people or things. Some of us respond by trying to control people and situations as a way of protecting ourselves. This control tendency can heighten rather than diminish anxiety. “God knows what could happen if I don’t remain on top of things,” we think. And sometimes, as people of faith, we think we can avoid anxiety if we live “good” lives or do the “right” things. The Gospel doesn’t promise that kind of control. Jesus didn’t seem to have it himself. The Apostle Paul goes beyond the priest’s parenthetical prayer for “delivery from unnecessary anxiety,” by telling us not to be anxious at all. “Be anxious for nothing, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known to God, and the peace of God, which passes all understanding will keep your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus.” (Philippians 4:7,8)

This may sound like an unrealistic approach. If we think of St. Paul’s injunction as a band-aid, something to be applied only when we have a spike of anxiety, the results will be inconsistent. If we make it part of our daily practice to turn over anxiety producing thoughts to God and relax our control needs it can help us to keep in touch with the source of Peace and diminish much of our “unnecessary” anxiety. It can also help us to see, as my grandmother used to say, that “the illusion of control is just... an illusion!”

The in-between period in the life of a church can be anxiety producing. Even in the latter stages the threat of additional change hangs in the air. The antidote, for me at least, is to loosen my grip a little and be reminded that God is at work in our individual and collective lives to keep us open to the mysterious and maturing work of the Spirit. C.G. Jung, the Swiss psychiatrist once said, “The process of maturity (“Individuation”, he called it.) continues throughout life, we can either cooperate with it, or be dragged through the process.”

May the Peace of Christ guard your hearts and minds and deliver you from all unnecessary anxiety.

This year there are additions to the Power of Attorney document you may want to think about as well. Perhaps also you will think about including Springfield in your will.

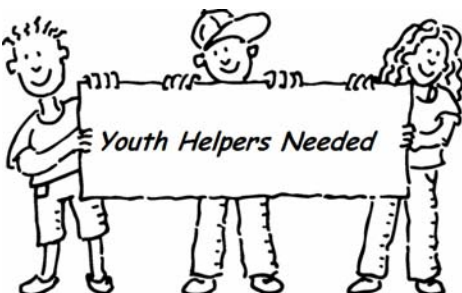

What does Pentecost mean? Special offering for Pentecost – 12 June

What does the word “Pentecost” mean? According to the American Heritage dictionary, the word comes from the Greek and Latin roots “pentekoste”, which literally means “the fiftieth day”. In the Christian tradition, this means “the fiftieth day after the resurrection”. According to the book of Acts, Jesus stayed with the disciples for 40 days after he was resurrected. He then went into heaven but promised that He would send the Holy Spirit to the disciples. Ten days later, the Holy Spirit descended upon them as Jesus had promised. So, 40 days plus another 10 = 50: “pentekoste”. (I love it when the math actually works out!)

“Pentecost” is special to us Christians because that’s the day that the Holy Spirit descended on the disciples. With the help of the Holy Spirit, they were able to speak other languages and converse with people from other lands. (As a linguist, I can really appreciate the ability to communicate with someone in their native tongue.) Because the disciples had this ability, they were able to convince many people to follow Jesus that very day (thousands, according to the Bible). It was really the beginning of the church. Cool!

We take up a special offering on Pentecost to commemorate this truly miraculous occasion. For 2011, the theme of the offering is John 20:21 – “As the Father has sent me, I am sending you.” With the gift of the Holy Spirit, Jesus sends us to take His message into the world.

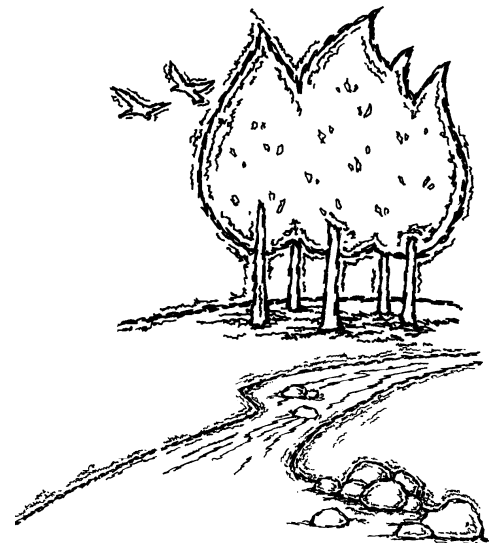
How does the Presbyterian Church use your Pentecost offering? The offering is focused on children and youth and your contributions are divided in this way:

- 40% Congregational ministries with children at risk
- 50% General Assembly ministries with youth and young adults
- 10% Child advocacy at the national level

Soles 4 Souls – Barefoot Sunday is 12 June!



I've been going through the closets at home to look for shoes to contribute to Soles 4 Souls – an organization that collects gently used shoes and distributes them both nationally and internationally to people who have NO shoes at all. I don't know about you, but my family has an awful lot of shoes – tennis shoes, walking shoes, running shoes, casual shoes, dress shoes, and bedroom shoes. Oh, and let's not forget all the flip-flops and sandals we have as well! With as many shoes as we are blessed to have, it's hard to believe that there are some people who have NO shoes at all. They walk around barefoot all the time. Some of these people are in cities and run the risk daily of injuring their feet – and they don't have the medical care needed to care for their injuries.



As you're considering what kind of shoes to donate, please remember – these people don't have ANY shoes, so they are very happy to get anything. I would probably not consider any shoes that are falling apart, but pretty much anything else would be OK.

The shoe drive we're sponsoring will culminate on 12 June in "Barefoot Sunday". You can wear the shoes you plan to contribute and slip them off – then bring them forward during the Time with Children to be collected. Or you can put them in a bag, or just carry them up – however you choose to contribute is fine. We are also asking that you put a rubber band around each pair and contribute \$1 per pair to defray shipping costs. Thank you in advance for your support of this mission project!
